These days you are spoiled for choice if you love watching TV shows like I do. The dilemma is not what-to-watch, rather it is what-not-to-watch. In the presence of such

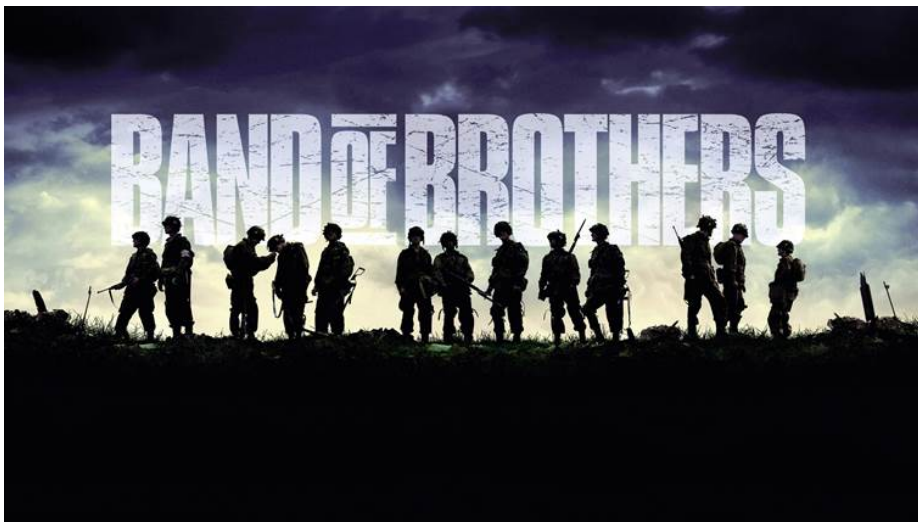

1. Big Mouth

This show created by Jonathan Nolan is basically about artificial intelligence. The writing is good, and that is no surprise considering that people like Nolan and JJ Abrams are involved in the show. Lost fans would find themselves at home, not because the two shows are in any way similar, but because Michael Emerson is at the top of his game in both shows. 4. Star Trek: Discovery

The Walking Dead actor Sonequa Martin-Green and Doug Jones play the leads. Martin-Green is already receiving a lot of praise for her performance and the series too has been lauded by the critics. 5. Madam Secretary



Téa Leoni stars as the Secretary of State and the series focuses on the troubles she faces whilst balancing her professional life and family. 6. Curb Your Enthusiasm



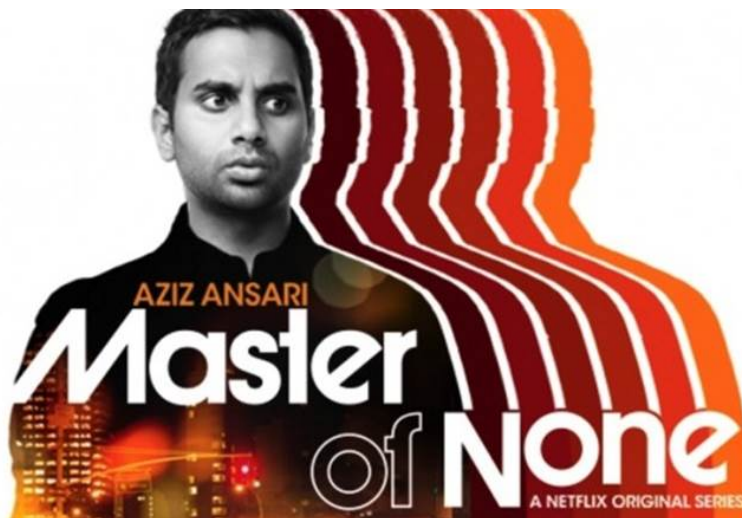

9. The Strain



Created by Guillermo del Toro and Chuck Hogan and based on their novel series of the same name, *The Strain* is the story of an outbreak of a virus that purportedly makes people vampires... of a sort. This series has elements that the fans of [HP Lovecraft](#) would love. Vampires in pop culture may be old, but you don't really lose interest in them, especially a vampire apocalypse! *The Strain* streams on Hotstar.

10. Van Helsing



Van Helsing is the second series on this list with vampire apocalypse at its core. It only goes to support my argument that the vampire genre will never get old.
